A good RESPONSE from the listener is very important for any station on short wave, also for FRS-Holland. In the course of the years we have been receiving thousands of letters from all parts of Europe, some even from South and North-America. A good response gives you th feeling listeners CARE about the station. And secondly you get to know what people think of the programmes you are putting on the air. One who regurlarly writes shows he really cares about FRS-Holland. I this way the relationship station / listener is STRENGTHENED. Recep tion reports are important and interesting for a short wave station. You are anxious to read how reception is / was in the different parts of Europe. However: we must stress out that apart from your reception reports a PERSONAL LETTER is highly appreciated. An inpersonal, preprinted reception reports always gives you the feeling the writer is only interested in a qsl-card. The listener who sends us a personal letter will always get a personal reply from one of our deejays. Kee that in mind. We don't want to be a 'qsl station' but a station ente tains its listeners with good programmes. Returning to the subject o reception reports: a report must cover a period of at least 30 minutes including a number of programme details. Not just 'pop-music' or 'male announcement' but the name of the record and the artist(s) and the announcement you heard must be mentioned in the report. A CORREC reception report will be verified with one of our gsl cards. We stri ve after quick replies from your mail. It must be pointed out your letters are sent to our P.O.Box. Then the letters are collected and forwarded to the FRS-Holland 'headquarters'. As you will understand most of the letters could be for at least a few days in Dedemsvaart before they will actually be forwarded to one of FRS-Holland's dee-
